#### Wood Bank News

We have used up the first 55 gallon barrel of Wood Sealer. It has been a pleasant surprise how popular this resource has been. We have also received a new barrel of sealer to enable us to continue making it available to our RMWT members. This year we had to pay a little more, so the price is \$9.00 per gallon for our members. As before, you need to supply your containers as John just doesn't have any.

When we finish processing the new barrel of Sealer, the old empty steel barrel is available to any RMWT member. First come first served. John will not accept any reservations for the barrel over the phone. Due to the pump not being able to completely remove all of the sealer, there may be some residue in the bottom of the barrel. The top of the barrel may be removed by unbolting the ring clamp holding it onto the body.

We are continuing to move a lot of wood into and out of the Wood Bank. The types of wood available change frequently. We are starting to get some larger pieces in the Bank. If you don't have a chainsaw, then John can cut it for you as per your needs.

# Last Month's Demonstration By John I. Giem

On May 13, 2010, John Wessels from South Africa demonstrated how he uses pewter to enhance



his woodturnings. He started by showing a computer slide show of his works and how he does it.

John does two types of enhancements with pewter; cast and turned, and embossed sheet pewter.

For cast and turned pewter, he starts by making a mold of the desired shape out of wood. The pewter is melted using a propane heater and then poured into the wooden mold. The melting point of pewter is low enough that there is no significant damage to the wooden mold. The pewter with the mold is mounted on the lathe where it is turned into the desired shape using scrapers. The wooden mold is turned off. Epoxy is then used to attach the turned pewter onto the flat rim of a wooden bowl. The bowl is then mounted on the lathe where he finishes the turning of the bowl and the pewter rim.



John mounted a pewter button on the lathe and demonstrated how to shape it using scrapers and other tools.

After achieving the desired size and shape, he textured the surface using a chatter tool. The pewter button was removed from the lathe and he used chemicals to create a patina on the surface. After drying, the button was replaced on the lathe. Steel

wool was used to burnish the surface which helped bring out the surface's textures.



Sheet pewter embossing can be classified into two types, low relief and high relief. The embossing is performed using two surfaces, one being hard the other soft. The soft surface can be made using several sheets of newsprint. For really deep embossing the palm of the hand can be used.

The general process is to draw the desired design on a piece of vellum. The vellum is then taped on the back side of the sheet pewter with the front of the design toward the pewter. The

pewter is placed face down on the soft surface and the design is pressed into the sheet from the back. The sheet is then turned face up and placed on the hard surface and the top surface is cleaned up. When working from the back, use a soft surface; from the front use a hard surface. Switch back and forth from front to back to emboss and clean up the design.



minimize damage and collapse.

John used a stylus to create freehand designs, and special embossing wheels to impress patterns on the sheet pewter. He also used a "hoof" shaped tool made of hard plastic to flatten wrinkles and clean up the design.

When the embossing was finished, he coated it with a copper patina and then burnished it with steel wool to bring out the design.

For deep relief embossing, the back of the design is backfilled to support to the embossed image to
